



In honor of "Holocaust Remembrance Day" the Christian Education Ministry Committee has made arrangements for Mr. Jack Repp, a holocaust survivor, to come to Gainesville on Tuesday, May 23<sup>rd</sup>, to share his experiences. This free event will be held at the State Theater in Gainesville and will begin at 7:00 PM.

Mr. Repp was born in 1923 in Poland. His family was interned in the Radom ghetto in 1941. He worked in a labor camp in Radom from 1941-1942, a Radom concentration camp in Radom from 1942-1943, an ammunition factory until the end of 1943, and then ended up in Auschwitz. He and his sister were the only family members to survive the war. He moved to the United States in 1949, and to Dallas in 1950.

This is a very unique opportunity for Gainesville to hear the story of the holocaust from someone who was there. Everyone is invited to come and experience a moment in history.
